





## **ABOUT IOM**

Established in 1951, IOM is the leading intergovernmental organization in the field of migration and works closely with governmental, intergovernmental and non-governmental partners; IOM became a United Nations related organization in 2016. With 175 Member States, a further eight States holding observer status and offices in over 100 countries, IOM is dedicated to promoting humane and orderly migration for the benefit of all. It does so by providing services and advice to governments and migrants.

IOM supports migrants across the world, developing effective responses to the shifting dynamics of migration and, as such, is a key source of advice on migration policy and practice. The Organization works in emergency situations, developing the resilience of all people on the move, and particularly those in situations of vulnerability, as well as building capacity within governments to manage all forms and impacts of mobility.



#### MIGRATION RESEARCH IN IOM

IOM's Constitution recognizes the importance of research on migration for informing migration policies and countering misinformation on migration and migrants. The Migration Research and Publications Division is one of IOM's oldest Divisions, with its establishment stretching back to the very beginning of IOM in the 1950s. The Division comprises the Research Unit, the Publications Unit and the Library.

In addition to diverse functions, the Division is responsible for managing and producing the biennial IOM flagship publication, the World Migration Report series, for which it collaborates closely with some of the leading academic and applied researchers and other migration experts from across the world.

#### THE WORLD MIGRATION REPORT SERIES

The World Migration Report is IOM's flagship publication, having been produced biennially since 2000. The report responds to a clear and growing need for rigorous, balanced and evidence-based research and analysis on migration.

The World Migration Report series was revised (starting with the 2018 edition) and now includes two parts: in Part I of the report, readers can examine the key data and information on migration globally. The thematic chapters of Part II provide an evidence-based analysis of complex and emerging migration issues.

With these contents, the Report is able to meet the needs of those with a general interest in migration as well as those needing more in-depth analysis, including people who work in migration policy, practice, research and communications. Recent editions have been widely utilized by policymakers, media outlets, academics, students, and migration practitioners.

The current edition, the World Migration Report 2024, is the 12th in the series. It has been produced in line with IOM's Environment Policy and is available online only. Printed hard copies have not been made in order to reduce paper, printing, and transportation impacts.

Over the years, the World Migration Report has also become more than a PDF report sitting on a virtual shelf. Keeping up with today's increasingly digital world and the needs of its ever-growing audience, the World Migration Report series is now complemented by a set of digital tools that will be progressively updated as new editions are released. In a first for IOM, the 2024 edition of the World Migration Report is the first time that the Organization has published a report in HTML. ## The World Migration Report Interactive Webpage

Launched in May 2021, the interactive webpage draws upon the extensive analysis of migration trends and patterns made throughout the World Migration Reports series. Data visualizations allow users to explore and interact with some of the latest migration data and information.

The interactive webpage has been recognized in several awards, such as in the 2022 Questar Awards (winning Gold), 2022 iNova Awards (winning Gold) and in the 2021 International Annual Report Design Awards (IADA) competition, also winning Gold in the online category, among other recognitions.
