Long-term trend in international migration

Note: The number of entities (such as States, territories and administrative regions) for which data were made available in the UN DESA International Migrant Stock 2020 was 232. In 1970, the number of entities was 135.

This data snapshot shows the growth in the number of international migrants globally over the last five decades. The estimated total has more than tripled, increasing from 84 million in 1970 to around 281 million in 2020. As a proportion of the global population, however, the number of international migrants has increased only slightly, from 2.3 per cent to 3.6 per cent.

It is estimated that COVID-19 may have reduced the growth in the international migrant population by around two million. In other words, had there not been COVID-19, the number of international migrants in 2020 would have likely been around 283 million.
