


## **WORLD MIGRATION REPORT DATA SNAPSHOT**

## Where does internal displacement occur globally?

As the saying goes "a picture can be worth a thousand words", so these data snapshots have been provided to help explain changes in migration through innovative data analysis. The "thousand words" can be found in the report itself—clicks on the link below.



This Data Snapshot shows the geographic locations of internal displacement events in 2020.

As can be seen in the figure, many more countries are affected by internal *disaster* displacement (144 in 2020) compared to those affected by internal displacement due to conflict and violence (42 countries). Disaster displacement events include, for example, those related to floods, hurricanes and wild-fires.

While many disaster displacement events are usually associated with short-term evacuations in a relatively safe and orderly manner, this is not the case for all disaster events and rarely the case for displacement due to conflict and violence.

While dramatic weather events make headlines and highlight the immediate impact of disaster displacement, the slow onset impacts of climate change also underpin displacement and migration. Slow onset scenarios include extremely high temperatures and drying conditions as well as sea-level rise, which are more likely to give people time to plan and gather the resources to migrate.
